Titles of Nobility (1835 Connecticut Statute)

THE PUBLIC STATUTE LAWS

L.S. BE IT REMEMBERED: that on the 22nd day of December, A.D. 1835, the State of Connecticut, (by their Agent, ROYAL R. HINMAN,) of the said District, have deposited in this office the title of a book, the title of which is in the words following, to wit: "The Public Statute Laws of the State of Connecticut, compiled in obedience to a resolve of the General Assembly, passed May 1835, to which is prefixed the Declaration of Independence, Constitution of the United States, and Constitution of the State of Connecticut. Published by authority of the State."

The right whereof they claim as proprietors in conformity with an act of Congress entitled.

ARTICLE 13

If any citizen of the United States shall accept, claim, receive, or retain any title of nobility or honor, without the consent of congress, accept and retain any present, pension, office, or emolument of any kind what ever, from any emperor, king, prince, or foreign power, such person shall cease to be a citizen of the United States, and shall be incapable of holding any office, trust or profit under them, or either of them. \*

\* Side Note to Amendment

Citizenship forfieted by the acceptance, from a foreign power, of any title of nobility, office or emulant of any kind.
